In 1996 the Secretary of the Interior issued a Record of Decision following a lengthy Environmental Impact Statement process. The ROD was intended to improve the conditions of key resources of the Colorado River in Grand Canyon. Monitoring and research activities conducted before and after the ROD have shown that not all resource expectations are being met. Attend this three-day symposium to learn why and what is being done about it. The Glen Canyon Dam Adaptive Management Program is intended to provide advice to the Secretary regarding measures that could be taken to improve the condition of the Colorado River Ecosystem. Twenty-five "stakeholders" work together to make these recommendations. This symposium will present the most current scientific and technical information that stakeholders are using to make management decisions.
